Brownfields Revolving Loan Fund

Brownfields are defined as abandoned, idled, or under-used industrial and commercial facilities where expansion or redevelopment is complicated by real or perceived environmental contamination. Low interest loans are available for cleanup of contaminated Brownfield properties. Loans are available to public or private sector entities, but not to the original contaminating entity.

The Coastal Loan Fund and Revolving Loan Fund provide supplemental financing for expansion and start-up projects for businesses that create jobs in areas impacted by declines in fishing and timber industries. The business must be located in Clallam, Jefferson, Grays Harbor, Pacific or Wahkiakum counties. The maximum loan amount is \$150,000.

Coastal Revolving Technical Assistance Loan Fund

The Coastal Revolving Loan Fund allows low interest loans for the purchase of technical assistance or community development strategies. The business must be located in Clallam, Jefferson, Grays Harbor, Pacific or Wahkiakum counties. The maximum amount is \$50,000.

Financial assistance is available to qualified small and medium-sized forest products manufacturing firms. These loans may be used to finance projects that contribute to the diversification of the forest products industry. This fund is available to all areas of the state. The maximum loan amount is \$1 million.

The Housing and Urban Development Section 108 program is designed for businesses that will create jobs in qualified lower-income areas. The program is funded

through the HUD program and is available through cities and counties which are eligible to receive Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding from Commerce. The maximum loan is \$7 million.

Industrial Revenue Bonds

Industrial Revenue Bonds provide financing for land, building and equipment for new and expanding manufacturing plants. These loans may be used to encourage relocations and expansions of companies that provide jobs and expand economic opportunities for residents and the community. Tax exempt bonds may be applied for by the manufacturer, processing company or wholesale distribution center to the Washington Economic Development Finance Authority (WEDFA) and public corporations created by port districts, cities, towns, and counties can have issuing authority.

IMPORTANT STATE AGENCIES TO KNOW

Department of Agriculture

The Washington State Department of Agriculture (with representatives in Tokyo, Taipei and Shanghai) helps food and agricultural producers find overseas buyers and export Washington food products. They also assist farmers and ranchers to directly market their products through local farmers markets and other outlets.

WSDA licenses food processing and handling facilities, including dairies and also certify organic foods. The agency inspects fruits, vegetables, grains and other commodities produced in Washington for domestic markets and for export through Washington's ports. They also provide technical assistance to companies and issue export documents.

Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation

The Washington Department of Ecology, is an environmental regulatory agency for the state of Washington. The department administers laws and regulations pertaining to the areas of water quality, water rights and water resources, shoreline management, toxic clean-up, nuclear waste, hazardous waste and air quality. It also conducts monitoring and scientific assessments. Ecology is in charge of environmental permits such as the wastewater discharge permit.

Department of Financial Institutions

The Washington State Department of Financial Institutions (DFI) regulates and examines a variety of state chartered financial services. The department also provides education and outreach to protect consumers from financial fraud. Department of Labor and Industries (L&I)

L&I is a diverse state agency dedicated to the safety, health and security of Washington's workers. The department staff helps employers meet safety and health standards and inspects workplaces when alerted to hazards.

One of the requirements employers have to meet in Washington is to carry industrial insurance for each employee. The employer gains immunity from lawsuits should an employee become injured or ill while on the job. A business can register for industrial insurance when it files for a Master Business Application.

Department of Licensing

The Department of Licensing (DOL), along with the Departments of Revenue, Labor and Industries and Employment Security, has created an easy one-stop business registration process. By filing a Master Business Application on DOL's website or at a local Business Licensing field office, business owners can apply for state business licenses, some city licenses and register one or more trade names for a business. If the structure is a corporate entity, it should first file with the Secretary of State, Division of Corporations and Charities before filing their MBA with other agencies.

Federal Employer Identification Number (FEIN)

Sole proprietors who are not employers usually do not need to apply for a FEIN. All other business entity types must apply for this registration through the IRS at 1-800-829-4933 or online at:

Department of Revenue

DOR is responsible for administering and collecting retail sales tax, business and occupation tax, and use tax. DOR is also responsible for specialty taxes such as property tax, timber tax, leasehold tax, public utility tax, fish tax, and hotel tax. Washington State does not have a corporate or personal income tax.

Secretary of State

Corporations

The Corporations Division registers domestic and foreign corporations, limited liability companies, limited partnerships, LLPs and LLLPs. The division also registers state-level trademarks, immigration assistants, international student exchange programs, domestic partnerships, and accepts service of process.

Charities Program

The Charitable Solicitations Program registers individuals, organizations, and commercial fundraisers that solicit charitable donations from the general public. Both the benefiting charities as well as independent, for profit entities soliciting funds must, in most cases, register annually.

The Charitable Trust Program registers individuals and organizations that are holding assets in Washington State in trust for a charitable purpose. The assets are invested for income-producing purposes. The income is then designated and distributed for a charitable purpose according to the terms and conditions of the trust agreement.

Registrations pursuant to the Charitable Solicitation and Trust Acts are separate from and in addition to corporate filing requirements.

SELLING TO THE GOVERNMENT

Certification

Office of Minority and Women's Business Enterprises (OMWBE)

The public contracting and procurement policies and programs of the Office of Minority and Women's Business Enterprises (OMWBE) foster the development and growth of all small businesses while encouraging, honoring and promoting diversity without preference based upon race, ethnicity or gender. The success of all small businesses, regardless of the race, ethnicity or gender of their owners is supported through OMWBE's activities.

Businesses interested in becoming certified as a minority, woman or disadvantaged business enterprise may complete OMWBE's QUIKCHEK (located on its website) to determine the likelihood of eligibility for certification. Certification may help you do business with federal and state governments as well as private sector entities with Supplier Diversity Programs. Certified businesses should directly contact federal, state, and local jurisdictions with whom they are interested in doing business to be placed on their solicitation lists for contracting and procurement opportunities.

Export Finance Assistance Center of Washington (EFACW)

The Export Finance Assistance Center of Washington (EFACW) assists local businesses with the “payment” and “finance” aspects of selling internationally. EFACW staff work with local businesses in researching prospective foreign buyers, structuring appropriate payment terms, and engaging third-party support to cover foreign payment risk. Northwest Trade Adjustment Assistance Center (TAAC)

The Northwest Trade Adjustment Assistance Center (TAAC) is a non-profit organization that assists import-injured manufacturers and agriculture through grants from the U.S. Department of Commerce. TAAC staff helps eligible firms develop and implement a recovery strategy to regain a competitive position in the workplace. TAAC accomplishes this by providing technical assistance in manufacturing, marketing, product development, finance, and management. Business assistance in the qualification stage is free. However, costs for providing strategic planning and technical assistance are shared by the business and the federal government.

DEVELOPING A BUSINESS PLAN

Business experts say developing a written business plan is the most important thing one can do before beginning a business. Existing businesses should continually update their plans. The following information and questions will help in preparing a business plan.

Plan Summary

The Plan Summary is a one or two page summary describing your business to prospective lenders and investors. A well-developed plan will help convince lenders or investors to examine your business further. Even though a Plan Summary appears first in your business plan, you should write it last.

Your Plan Summary should include:

1. A brief description of the company's history
2. Description of products and services
3. How you intend to make the product
4. Management
5. What it will take to make a profit-break-even analysis
6. How much money you are seeking (if applicable)
7. How you will pay the money back (if applicable)

Purpose of the Business

1. What you want to accomplish
2. Mission statement
3. Description of the business

Product & Service Defined

1. The market that needs your product or service
2. A complete description of your product or service
3. The cost and profit of each product and service
4. Describe the break-even point
5. The major sources of competition
6. Proprietary features. Should your product or service have a patent or trademark?
7. Opportunities to better develop your product or service

Market Analysis

1. Market research. Size of market and how long it has existed. Barriers to your business entry and growth.
2. Target market. Who will buy your product or service?
3. Where do most of your sales occur?
4. How much do you expect to sell?

Market Strategy

1. Define your advantage. What is the difference between your product and service and your competitors'?
2. Evaluate the competition. What is the size of your competition? Market maturity?
3. Pricing Strategy. Is your price competitive?
4. Distribution channels. Which will you use?
5. Promotion. How will you tell others about your product or service?

Management

1. Identify your organizational structure and key employees
2. Provide a resume for each person
3. Identify management skills
4. Professional services
5. Identify any technical or specialty services

Schedule of Events

1. List critical dates
2. Make short-term goals
3. Project long-term goals
4. Identify barriers or risks and solutions

Financial Information

Legal and tax implications differ according to business structure. (See p.36-38 for a description). You may wish to obtain legal advice before making this decision. If you decide to register as a corporation, LLC, LP or LLP, contact the Secretary of State's Corporations Division at 360-725-0377.

State Business License

Washington's one stop registration process requires filing a Master Business Application to obtain a UBI (Unified Business Identifier) number and to register trade names. Specialty Licenses

In addition to a state license, you may need to get a city and/or county license for each location where you do business. Section 10:

CHOOSING THE RIGHT BUSINESS STRUCTURE

You may operate your business or organization under any one of several organizational structures. Each type of structure has certain advantages and disadvantages that should be considered. The descriptions of the structures below are provided to assist applicants and are not intended to be legal definitions with the force of law. You should contact an attorney, accountant, financial advisor, banker, or other business or legal advisors to determine which form is most suitable for your business or organization.

A Sole Proprietorship is one individual or married couple in business alone. Sole proprietorships are the most common form of business structure. This type of business is simple to form and operate, and may enjoy greater flexibility of management and fewer legal controls. However, the business owner is personally liable for all debts incurred by the business.

A General Partnership is composed of two or more persons (usually not a married couple) who agree to contribute money, labor, and/or skill to a business. Each partner shares the profits, losses, and management of the business and each partner is personally and equally liable for debts of the partnership. Formal terms of the partnership are usually contained in a written partnership agreement.

A Limited Partnership* is composed of one or more general partners and one or more limited partners. The general partners manage the business and share fully in its profits and losses. Limited partners share in the profits of the business, but their losses are limited to the extent of their investment. Limited partners are usually not involved in the day-to-day operations of the business.

A Limited Liability Partnership* is similar to a General Partnership except that normally a partner does not have personal liability for the negligence of another partner. This business structure is used most commonly by professionals such as accountants and lawyers.

The Limited Liability Limited Partnership* Beginning in January 2010 a limited partnership may opt to become a limited liability limited partnership by including a statement to that effect in its certificate of limited partnership. Status as a limited liability limited partnership provides general partners with a shield from liability for obligations of the limited liability limited partnership.

A Limited Liability Company (LLC)* is formed by one or more individuals or entities through a special written agreement. The agreement details the organization of the LLC, including: provisions for management, assignability of interests, and distribution of profits or losses. Limited

liability companies are permitted to engage in any lawful, for profit business or activity other than banking or insurance. Doing business as an LLC may yield tax or financial benefits.

A Corporation* is a legal entity, a corporation has certain rights, privileges, and liabilities beyond those of an individual. Doing business as a corporation may yield tax or financial benefits, but these can be offset by other considerations, such as decreased personal control. Corporations may be formed for profit or nonprofit purpose.

A Nonprofit Corporation* is a legal entity and is typically run to further some sort of ideal or goal, rather than in the interests of profit. Many nonprofits serve the public interest, but some do engage in private sector activities. If your nonprofit organization is or plans to fundraise from the public, it may also be required to register with the Charities Program of the Washington Secretary of State.

The Charitable Solicitations Program* registers individuals, organizations, and commercial fundraisers that solicit charitable donations from the general public. Both the benefiting charities as well as independent, for profit entities soliciting funds must, in most cases, register annually.

The Charitable Trust Program* registers individuals and organizations that are holding assets in Washington State in trust for a charitable purpose. The assets are invested for income-producing purposes. The income is then designated and distributed for a charitable purpose according to the terms and conditions of the trust agreement.

Charitable Solicitation and Charitable Trust registrations are separate from and in addition to corporate filing requirements.
